2.5 Psychiatric disorders

Some women using hormonal contraceptives including Levest have reported depression or depressed mood. Depression can be serious and may sometimes lead to suicidal thoughts. If you experience mood changes and depressive symptoms contact your doctor for further

2.6 Other medicines and Levest

Tell your doctor or pharmacist if you are taking, have recently taken or might take any other medicines. If you ever need to take another medicine at the same time as being on the Pill, always tell your doctor, pharmacist or dentist that you're laking Levest. Also check the leaflets that come with all your medicines to see if they can be taken with hormonal contraceptives.

Some medicines can have an influence on the blood levels of Levest and can stop it from working properly – for example:

- some medicines used to treat HIV and Hepatitis C Virus infections (so-called protease inhibitors and non-nucleoside reverse
- transcriptase inhibitors griseofulvin (an anti-fungal medicine)
- certain antibiotics
- certain sedatives (called barbiturates) St. John's Wort (a herbal remedy).

If you do need to take one of these medicines, Levest may not be suitable for you or you may need to use extra contraception for a while. Your doctor, pharmacist or dentist can tell you if this is necessary and for how long.

Levest can also affect how well other medicines work. Your doctor may need to adjust the dose of your other medicine.

In addition, Levest can also interfere with the results of some blood tests, so always tell your doctor that you are taking Levest if you have a

Do not take Levest if you have hepatitis C and are taking medicinal products containing ombitasvir/paritaprevir/ritonavir, dasabuvir, glecaprevir/pibrentasvir and sofosbuvir/velpatasvir/voxilaprevir, as these products may cause increases in liver function blood test results

Your doctor will prescribe another type of contraceptive prior to start of the treatment with these medicinal products. Levest can be restarted approximately 2 weeks after completion of this treatment. See section "Do not take Levest".

2.7 Levest with food and drink

Levest may be taken with or without food, if necessary with a small amount of water.

2.8 Pregnancy and breast-feeding

f you are pregnant or breast-feeding, think you may be pregnant or are planning to have a baby, ask your doctor or pharmacist for advice before taking this medicine.

If you are pregnant, do not take Levest. If you become pregnant while taking Levest you must stop immediately and contact your doctor. If you want to become pregnant, you can stop taking the pill at any time (see also section "If you want to stop taking Levest").

Use of Levest is generally not advisable when a woman is breast-feeding. If you want to take the pill while you are breast-feeding you should contact your doctor.

2.9 Driving and using machines

Levest does not have any known effect on your ability to drive or use machines.

2.10 Levest contains lactose and sucrose

Levest contains lactose and sucrose. If you have been told by your doctor that you have an intolerance to some sugars, contact your doctor before taking this medicine.

3. How to take Levest

3.1 How to take

To prevent pregnancy, always take Levest as described below. Check with your doctor or family planning nurse if you are not sure.

Take Levest every day for 21 days

- Levest comes in strips of 21 pills, each marked with a day of the week. Take your pill at the same time every day.
- Start by taking a pill marked with the correct day of the week.
- Follow the direction of the arrows on the strip. Take one pill each day, until you have finished all 21 pills. Swallow each pill whole, with water if necessary. Do not chew the pill.

Then have seven pill-free days After you have taken all 21 pills in the strip, you have seven days when you take no pills. So if you take the last pill of one pack on a Friday, you will take the first pill of your next pack on the Saturday of the following week.

Within a few days of taking the last pill from the strip, you should have a withdrawal bleed like a period. This bleed may not have finished when it is time to start your next strip of pills.

You don't need to use extra contraception during these seven pill-free days – as long as you have taken your pills correctly and start the

Then start your next strip

Start taking your next strip of Levest after the seven pill-free days - even if you are still bleeding. Always start the new strip on time.

As long as you take Levest correctly, you will always start each new strip on the same day of the week.

3.2 Starting Levest

As a new user or starting the Pill again after a break

It is best to take your first Levest pill on the first day of your next period. By starting in this way, you will have contraceptive protection with

Changing to Levest from another contraceptive Pill

- If you are currently taking a 21-day Pill: start Levest the next day after the end of the previous strip. You will have contraceptive protection with your first pill. You will not have a bleed until after your first strip of Levest.
- If you are taking a 28-day Pill: start taking Levest the day after your last active pill. You will have contraceptive protection with your
- first pill. You will not have a bleed until after your first strip of Levest. • Or, if you are taking a progestogen-only Pill (POP or 'mini Pill'): start Levest on the first day of bleeding, even if you have already

taken the progestogen-only Pill for that day. You will have contraceptive cover straight away.


Starting Levest after a miscarriage or abortion

If you have had a miscarriage or an abortion during the first three months of pregnancy, your doctor may tell you to start taking Levest straight away. This means that you will have contraceptive protection with your first pill.

If you have had a miscarriage or an abortion after the third month of pregnancy, ask your doctor for advice. You may need to use extra contraception, such as condoms, for a short time.

Contraception after having a baby

If you have just had a baby, your doctor may advise you that Levest should be started 21 days after delivery provided that you are fully mobile. You do not have to wait for a period. You will need to use another method of contraception, such as a condom, until you start Levest and for the first 7 days of pill taking.



If you have missed any of the pills in a strip, and you do not bleed in the first pill-free break, you may be pregnant. Contact your doctor or family planning clinic, or do a pregnancy test yourself.

advice as soon as possible.

If you start a new strip of pills late, or make your 'week off' longer than seven days, you may not be protected from pregnancy. If you had sex in the last seven days, ask your doctor, family planning nurse or pharmacist for advice. You may need to consider emergency contraception. You should also use extra contraception, such as a condom, for seven days.

3.4 A lost pill

If you lose a pill,

Either take the last pill of the strip in place of the lost pill. Then take all the other pills on their proper days. Your cycle will be one day shorter than normal, but your contraceptive protection won't be affected. After your seven pill-free days you will have a new starting day, one day earlier than before.

Or if you do not want to change the starting day of your cycle, take a pill from a spare strip if you have one. Then take all the other pills from your current strip as usual. You can then keep the opened spare strip in case you lose any more pills.

3.5 If you are sick or have diarrhoea

If you are sick (vomit) or have very bad diarrhoea within 4 hours of taking the Pill, your body may not get its usual dose of hormones from that pill. If you are better within 12 hours of taking Levest, follow the instructions in section 3.4 A lost pill, which describes how to take If you are still sick or have diarrhoea more than 12 hours after taking Levest, see section 3.3, A missed pill.

Talk to your doctor if your stomach upset carries on or gets worse. He or she may recommend another form of contraception.

3.6 Missed a period – could you be pregnant?

Occasionally, you may miss a withdrawal bleed. This could mean that you are pregnant, but that is very unlikely if you have taken your pills correctly. Start your next strip at the normal time. If you think that you might have put yourself at risk of pregnancy (for example, by missing pills or taking other medicines), or if you miss a second bleed, you should do a pregnancy test. You can buy these from the chemist or get a free test at your family planning clinic or doctors surgery. If you are pregnant, stop taking Levest and see your doctor.

3.7 Taking more than one pill should not cause harm

It is unlikely that taking more than one pill will do you any harm, but you may feel sick, vomit or have some vaginal bleeding. Even girls who have not yet started to menstruate but have accidentally taken this medicine may experience such bleeding. Talk to your doctor if you have any of these symptoms.

3.8 When you want to get pregnant

If you are planning a baby, it's best to use another method of contraception after stopping Levest until you have had a proper period. Your doctor or midwife relies on the date of your last natural period to tell you when your baby is due. However, it will not cause you or the baby any harm if you get pregnant straight away.

If you have any further questions on the use of this medicine, ask your doctor or pharmacist.

4. Possible side effects

Like all medicines, this medicine can cause side effects, although not everybody gets them. If you get any side effect, particularly if severe and persistent, or have any change to your health that you think may be due to Levest, please talk to your doctor.

An increased risk of blood clots in the veins (venous thromboembolism (VTE)) or blood clots in the arteries (arterial thromboembolism (ATE)) is present for all women using combined hormonal contraceptives. For more detailed information on the different risks from taking combined hormonal contraceptives please see section 2 "What you need to know before you use Levest".

Tell your doctor, pharmacist or family planning nurse if you are worried about any side effects which you think may be due to Levest.

4.1 Serious side effects – see a doctor straight away

Contact a doctor immediately if you experience any of the following symptoms of angioedema: swollen face, tongue and/or throat and/or difficulty swallowing or hives potentially with difficulty breathing (see also section "2.2 When to take special care with Levest").

Rare side effects (may affect up to 1 in 1,000 people)

- harmful blood clots in a vein or artery for example: o in a leg or foot (i.e. DVT)
- o in a lung (i.e. PE)
- heart attack
- o stroke
- o mini-stroke or temporary stroke-like symptoms, known as a transient ischaemic attack (TIA) o blood clots in the liver, stomach/intestine, kidneys or eye.

The chance of having a blood clot may be higher if you have any other conditions that increase this risk (see section 2 for more information on the conditions that increase risk for blood clots and the symptoms of a blood clot).

Signs of a blood clot (see section 2.3 'Blood clots')

 dimpling of the skin changes in the nipple

Signs of breast cancer include:

any lumps you can see or feel.

Signs of cancer of the cervix include:

- vaginal discharge that smells and/or contains blood unusual vaginal bleeding
- pelvic pain
- painful sex.

Signs of severe liver problems include: severe pain in your upper abdomen

- yellow skin or eyes (jaundice)
- inflammation of the liver (hepatitis)
- vour whole body starts itching.
- If you think you may have any of these, see a doctor straight away. You may need to stop taking Levest.

4.2 Less serious side effects

Common side effects (may affect up to 1 in 10 people) feeling sick

- stomach ache
- putting on weight headaches
- depressive moods or mood swings
- sore or painful breasts
- **Uncommon side effects** (may affect up to 1 in 100 people) being sick and stomach upsets
- fluid retention
- migraine loss of interest in sex
- breast enlargement skin rash, which may be itchy
- Rare side effects (may affect up to 1 in 1,000 people) poor tolerance of contact lenses

increase of interest in sex

- vaginal or breast discharge
- allergic reactions
- allergic reactions which can sometimes be severe with swelling of the skin and/or mucous membranes (erythema nodosum & erythema multiforme)

Other side effects reported

- Bleeding and spotting between your periods can sometimes occur for the first few months but this usually stops once your body has adjusted to Levest. If it continues, becomes heavy or starts again, contact your doctor (see section 4.3).
- Chloasma (yellow brown patches on the skin). This may happen even if you have been using Levest for a number of months. Chloasma may be reduced by avoiding too much sunlight and/or UV lamps
- Occurrence or deterioration of the movement disorder chorea
- . Crohn's disease or ulcerative colitis • Elevated levels of fat in the blood (hypertriglyceridaemia)
- Conditions that may worsen during pregnancy or previous use of the Pill:
- yellowing of the skin (jaundice)
- persistent itching (pruritus) kidney or liver problems
- certain rare medical conditions such as systemic lupus erythematosus blister-like rash (herpes gestationis) whilst pregnant
- an inherited form of deafness (otosclerosis) a personal or family history of a form of sickle cell disease
- swelling of body parts (hereditary angioedema)
- an inherited disease called porphyria cancer of the cervix

Tell your doctor, pharmacist or family planning nurse if you are worried about any side effects which you think may be due to Levest. Also tell them if any existing conditions get worse while you are taking Levest.

4.3 Bleeding between periods should not last long

A few women have a little unexpected bleeding or spotting while they are taking Levest, especially during the first few months. Normally, this bleeding is nothing to worry about and will stop after a day or two. Keep taking Levest as usual. The problem should disappear after the first few strips. You may also have unexpected bleeding if you are not taking your pills regularly, so try to take your pill at the same time every day. Also,

unexpected bleeding can sometimes be caused by other medicines.

- **Make an appointment to see your doctor** if you get breakthrough bleeding or spotting that: carries on for more than the first few months
- starts after you've been taking Levest for a while carries on even after you've stopped taking Levest.

If you get any side effects, talk to your doctor or pharmacist. This includes any possible side effects not listed in this leaflet. You can also report side effects directly via the Yellow Card Scheme,

By reporting side effects you can help provide more information on the safety of this medicine. 5. How to store Levest

Keep this medicine out of the sight and reach of children.

Store below 25°C. Do not use Levest after the expiry date which is stated on the carton after 'EXP'. The expiry date refers to the last day of that month. Do not throw away the medicines via wastewater or household waste. Ask your pharmacist how to throw away medicines you no longer use. These measures will help protect the environment.

6. Contents of the pack and other information

What Levest contains

- The active substances are levonorgestrel (150mcg) and ethinylestradiol (30mcg).
- The other ingredients are lactose monohydrate, maize starch, povidone k-25, sucrose, talc, calcium carbonate, povidone k-90, glycerin, macrogol 6000, titanium dioxide, magnesium stearate and carnauba wax.

What Levest looks like and contents of the pack Levest tablets are white, circular, biconvex and sugar coated.

Each blister pack contains 21 tablets.

Levest is sold in cartons of 1, 3, 6 or 13 blister packs. Not all pack sizes may be marketed.
